BAIL OF \$20,000 FORFEITED.

Court Acts When Defendant In Counterfeiting Case Is Absent.

Louis Reggione of 174 Thompson Street, one of six men being tried in the United States District Court in Brooklyn on charges of counterfeiting \$5 bills, failed to appear yesterday. Judge Grover M. Moscowitz ordered his \$20,000 bail bond forfeited and canceled bail set for the other five defendants, remanding them to the Federal detention prison for the remainder of the trial.

By order of the court the trial proceeded with Reggione absent, his counsel, Michael R. Matteo, being directed to remain to protect his

client's rights.

Reggione was named by Charles Stern, a printer, of 611 West 180th Street, the Bronx, the principal witness called by the government, as the man who hired him to print \$1,000,000 in counterfeit notes and who promised him \$20,000 in real money for the job. Stern pleaded guilty on Wednesday.

Militia to Honor Canada Envoy.
